PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL UPDATE

he purpose of a Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is in essence to be a collaborative 'faith-filled' leadership group which engages in pastoral planning and considers areas of mission in our parish. For example: are we doing enough in the parish to be truly welcoming, inclusive and hospitable to all? Or, are there things happening which prevent us from being more welcoming and inclusive?



The **PPC Icon** provides useful guidance to the purpose of the PPC; the top left part of the Icon shows a bowl of water representing the water of our baptism and our constant need for formation; the top right section shows God's Word, nourishment for our Christian growth; the circle of candles on the bottom right, indicates our faith community and a sense of welcome and belonging that we have as an active participative community; the compass on the bottom left section signifies 'mission' and 'outreach' to all

corners of our parish and beyond; and these four aspects are supported through the Holy Trinity - God our Father, his beloved Son and the Holy Spirit

pirit.

Pope Francis says parish can be like "a village fountain"; a "sanctuary"; "a home" where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey. We pray Lord, that our parish may be a welcoming, loving and hospitable community to all.



Parish Survey

Parish Survey, undertaken by the PPC at 7.30pm Mass on Sunday 21st April 2018, forms a good basis for framing future parish initiatives. Of 180 questionnaires returned, the respondents were 60% female, 40% male, with 40% being under 50 years of age and 60% above. 68 respondents were visitors to Mount Merrion Parish (from 19 separate parishes, with Kilmacud, Dundrum, Booterstown and Blackrock being well represented).

Principal Survey Findings:

- In general, respondents find our parish/church to be welcoming and friendly, although some felt strongly about improving inclusion within the community of people who are lonely, isolated and/or marginalised.
- There was a strong desire to improve knowledge and personal development in matters of faith, religion and spirituality through talks, seminars and group discussions for different age groups.
- Some were not fully aware of the range of activities already undertaken / available within the Parish.
- There were many positive comments about Fr. Tony his homilies being insightful and his support, actions and words being inspirational.
- Respondents considered that relevant and meaningful homilies are invaluable and that the jimportance of prayer should be highlighted repeatedly.
- There was a strong consensus that the involvement of youth in parish activities is of great importance, with the lack of youth engagement being of serious concern to parents / grandparents.
- Respondents expressed a willingness to be involved at many levels of parish life but were often unsure how best to achieve this. A feeling was expressed that there should be constant changes to personnel in the various ministries in order to share out and mix around the opportunities and responsibilities.
- Various suggestions were made regarding how individuals of different age categories might be encouraged to volunteer in parish activities.
- Issues such as homelessness, the environment and refugees were considered very relevant and important, but were seen as being greater than just a parish problem. However, the Parish as a body should be seen to promote / support initiatives at both local and national level where appropriate.

HAITI SUMMER PROJECTS



ur recent collections in Mount Merrion and Kilmacud raised €10,844.93 for our Summer 2019 project. The continued support from the parishes over the last three years for our work in Haiti has been truly humbling, without which the Haiti project simply would not have happened. Knowing how warmly and fondly Fr.Tony speaks of his parishioners I am not surprised by such generosity and support.

This allowed us to do the following in July 2018: 650 local primary school children, specially selected from the poorest zones of the towns within which we work, attended our Sports and Literacy programme. They had a chance to live the reality that all children should live, which is to receive love, affection and unending encouragement.

Your support paid for all the resources and materials we used in this camp. It paid for the 26,000 meals we served to the children over the course of the project. It paid for the wages of the 82 Haitians we employed across the two camps. Simply incredible and I cannot thank you all enough.

I along with my fellow board members have set up a charity called Solèy Haiti (solèy being the Haitian Creole for sunshine) and our mantra is that we are working towards a brighter future for Haiti.

FUNERAL MINISTRY TEAM

ount Merrion Funeral Ministry established 9 years ago, currently have a team of 12 volunteers all who have had training in this Ministry.

The Funeral Ministry Team represents the Parish Community, providing support through a ministry of compassion and consolation to bereaved families. This is done in collaboration with the Priests of the Parish of Mount Merrion who work closely with the Team at each stage of the process.

Funeral Ministry Support at time of Bereavement:

- Meeting the bereaved family and assisting with the preparation of the Liturgy for the Reception of the Remains and the Funeral Mass.
- Being present in the church for the Reception of the Remains and Funeral Mass and assisting the bereaved family.
- Regularly attending the Graveside or Crematorium.

On the first Sunday of November there is a Mass for the Bereaved, prepared by the Funeral Ministry Team, Youth Group and Celebrant. Families who have been bereaved during the year are invited to participate in this very special Mass.

The mass which took place on November 4th last was preceded by a Candle of Light Ceremony to commemorate all parishioners and friends who have died. A large candle in a storm lantern was lit before morning masses that day. The celebrant took the candle to the Garden of Remembrance in the Church grounds where prayers were said. All families were presented with a candle of Remembrance and a cyclamen plant. The flickering candle reflects the light of faith and hope at the core of our storm-lantern being;

An appeal for more regular contributions

The parish income from regular contributions has been falling in recent years as the parish ages and the demographics change.

In order to facilitate the ongoing liturgy and pastoral activities and to assist with the upkeep of the church and grounds, we are targeting an increase of €50k in income.

If you are not currently contributing, and are in a position to do so, we are inviting you to contribute to the parish. It's easy and can be done.



Deficit

You may have seen from the 2017 Parish Accounts that the Parish is in a deficit position in relation to its running costs.

The deficit for 2017 is \le 14k after taking account of a healthy surplus from the Parish Centre of \le 47k and a substantial contribution from the shrines in the church of \le 47k. Ignoring these contributions the operating deficit would be significantly larger. (A copy of the Accounts is available on the parish website mountmerrionparish.ie).

Does all the money collected stay in the Parish?

This is a question we are asked frequently. The income from both collections at Mass plus the Christmas and Easter Dues do **NOT** form part of the parish funds. These funds are transferred directly to the Archdiocese. The first collection at Sunday Mass contributes towards the salaries of all the priests of the Diocese. The second collection contributes to the running costs of the Diocese, including Child Safeguarding Office, as well as other sections of the administration.

So, the only money collected which remains in the parish are the regular contributions (family offering / envelopes), donations, shrine offerings, Parish Shop profits and Parish Centre.

'Walk While You Can – Our Parish Journey'

n July 10 th, a misty morning, at 10am we set out on our walk from Letterkenny. It was unknown as to how far or how long we could go, but the aim was to reach Ballydehob 27 days later. Tony and two young teachers led the way setting a smart pace towards Ballybofey. It was the start of a journey that I will never forget.

Having previously run the Dublin city marathon with Tony and parishioners back in 2010, I was interested in taking part from the moment I heard about this venture. The challenge involved in walking from coast to coast is one which struck a chord with me. In hindsight, the month did have many similarities to a marathon. It was both a physical and mental challenge, yet along the way seeing familiar family and friends, and meeting many new people made each day different and became an adventure. It reminded me of the Camino, people

emotionally opened to each other with personal stories and a definite infectious sense of WWYC team comradery quickly developed.

I can safely say that I enjoyed every step of the way. I learned that sheep's wool between the toes was excellent for sore feet. Tobercurry in Sligo is a place that my feet will never forget – blistered, cold, and tired. Yet when I saw a man walking buckled over, refusing a lift, determined to walk every step of the journey onwards that day, the feet were reassured that we were all in this together.

On our journey we met GAA teams, multidenominational communities, farmers on tractors, elderly folk at gates, truck drivers and tourists all throwing donations into buckets, providing food, accommodation, socks, plasters, wheel pumps and

anything for us that we may have needed. We walked through villages I had never heard of, all of whom had a warm welcome and reception for us. The generosity and

friendliness of people throughout the whole of Ireland and so many (too many to name) from Tony's own life, was astonishing. I can only commend Tony for bringing us all together. I admire how one man has such an impressive support network behind him and am humbled that I have had the privilege to cross paths with so many of that network.

WWYC has brought Mount Merrion / Kilmacud, an already excellent community, even closer together. It has brought people with MND further together, many of whom we had the pleasure of meeting. It was a summer not to be forgotten with many memories formed, yet with over 500km complete I feel a level of sadness as to how it all came into being and am certain that I am not alone in that sentiment. I am deeply grateful for having been a part of this hugely successful project.

'And On We Go...'

WWYC Experience

"Tony's organising a Big Walk". As recent retirees we wondered "What can we do to contribute to this crazy initiative to walk from Letterkenny to Ballydehob" ... and in just over 6 weeks time?

Tracking the walk

We are hillwalkers, well used to reading maps and we have a GPS...so we offered to track the route and prepare daily detailed instructions for walkers.

The route had already been decided and published with its various 'pit-stops'. Our first thoughts were to keep to the main roads. However, once 'Google Maps' was engaged, we realised often the shorter walking distances between points A and B were on backroads. With consideration for those intending to do many stretches (especially 'Strongman' Michael O'Brien who was going to do it all) the road less travelled seemed like the best option.

Over the course of three weekends, we drove the route... like rally drivers putting their 'pace notes' together

"2km....main road...wide hard shoulder....2.6km....straight through roundabout...marshalling required....6km....turn left....tertiary road....10km....Daybreak shop in garage....etc."!!!!!!!

At times we wondered what sort of fund-raising would be achieved as we drove into some villages at 4 o'clock in the afternoon to find the one or two pubs that still existed shut and no sign of life in the village. How wrong we were with that view!

Anyway, onwards with the job. Daily route notes were drawn up and, with the wunderkind Johnny Blackmore always at the ready in London, the Route PDFs were uploaded onto the WWYC website in time.



We watched Twitter on Day 1 ... the WWYC crew arrived in Ballybofey ahead of schedule ... Route Notes must work ... Phew!! Maybe this walk will work!!

We joined the walk for the second week: Ballysadare to Tuam. Pat acted as one of the support drivers for most of the week, corralling the walkers with his 'verbal' loud-hailer and side-tracking to Michael at The Bike Clinic in Castlebar (to, yet again, get the tyre for the wheelchair sorted). Nuala spent the week walking in wonderful company trying to keep up with the pace set by the wheelchair.

And those quiet villages we encountered a few weeks previously? Why worry? Towns and villages sprung to life once WWYC entered. The gingham tablecloths were out, pots of tea were at the ready, sandwiches, scones and cakes were piled high and often local musicians were on hand to help us further enjoy our refreshments. Crowds emptied their pockets into Maureen's 'Moneybags' buckets to support Tony and their own local MND friends.

Leaving Tuam we knew we would have to join the walk again and booked our B&B in Ballydehob and we also did the Milford-Mallow and Mallow-Cork stages. The crowds seemed to get bigger by the day ... and the final leg to Ballydehob - wow! Church bells tolled, horses escorted us into town and an incredible community hall was full of trellis tables ready to serve over 300 people with home-made goodies. An amazing, wonderful and humbling experience.

The memories linger of

- the food for the journey for body, soul and spirit provided daily in abundance through the innate goodness and generosity of individuals and local communities.
- the sharing along the way, with friends and strangers alike, of stories about what life's journey had brought and the joys and tears that came with that. No agendas, no holding back — just loving trust and openness.

Financial targets for MND were more than doubled but, for those of us who walked, the memories are pearls beyond price.

We have to enter into the humility, simplicity, patience, and delicate nature of what's unfolding in our hearts to discover how God is being born in our lives. We are asked to bring this delicate simplicity out into the world."

(James Finley – Advent Reflections 2018)

A few weeks ago in October, Donal Dorr spent two evenings with us here in the parish. He was invited back this Autumn to offer us some space to reflect after the Pope's visit: to look at the impact of Francis' Message and to consider where to now? what's next? and what impact or inspiration has his visit left us with? What I was left with over the two evenings was the importance of the inner journey; the need to pause and reflect, to absorb and reconnect with what inspires each of us beyond the work, activities, meetings and outward engagements. I was struck by how important it is to constantly remember to find ways to connect with the heart of the Christian message in order to sustain and inform, from a deeper place, our activity and work at parish and organisational level.

It is so very easy to become disillusioned, to wonder about the future. For many, the concern is with loss, low attendance at masses and how we are to be relevant in culture and society going forward. To



me, it highlights the importance of going back to the source, to allow oneself to be nourished. The poets, mystics and the natural world around us invite us to this deeper sustaining place and they help us to reconnect with the mystery and message of love at the heart of the Christian story.

The arrival of Advent signals the beginning of a new year's cycle in the Church's liturgical calendar but around us too, the entire natural world has slowed down. If you notice the light at this time of year...it is soft and trickles gently into the day...because of the darkness, the light is even more noticeable. The Earth is resting...inviting us to rest and be still. It is an ancient wisdom, which we struggle to remember in the business and stress of this time of year. It invites us to reflect and to connect with what sustains us and what inspires us as a Christian community - the story of a child's coming into the world and the profound mystery of life and birth and love. As James Finley says in the opening quote, we must leave the business, the work, aside and take ourselves to the dark stable, in a sense, into the stillness and quiet of our own hearts.



BUILDING BRIDGES IN OUR PARISH



'ollowing the visit of Pope Francis to Ireland for the World Meeting of Families (WMOF) and his desire to hear the voices of the voiceless, and also inspired by the book 'Building A Bridge' written by Fr James Martin SJ (who was a speaker at the WMOF congress), Fr Tony extended a sincere, humble invitation to people from the LGBT Community in Mount Merrion/Kilmacud to his home, offering a space where their stories could be listened to respectfully. The short reports from the meetings reflect that what was heard was heart-warming and at times heart-breaking. It was sad, but not surprising, how rejected many felt by the language and harsh attitudes of those who profess to follow the commandment to love enunciated by Jesus. The gatherings heard from parents expressing their love for their children who are part of the LGBT community and from young men who won't allow any condemnatory message about their sexuality affect their right to be in the church or to go to Mass weekly. These meetings are entirely congruent with our desire to be and grow as a faith-filled welcoming parish and, as we go to print, the next such gathering will take place on December 6th again in Fr Tony's home, followed by a little Christmas celebration.

In a somewhat similar way, Fr Tony was prompted by Pope Francis' words to invite a small group to begin to find ways of more fully hearing the voices of women in our parish. More of this anon!

Óscar Romero – 14th October 2018

Pope Francis declared and defined Óscar Arnulfo Romero
Galdámez... to be saint and to enrol him among the saints, decreeing that he be venerated as such by the whole church. The pope wore the bloodstained rope belt worn by Archbishop Romero when he was murdered



For the faithful, his power came from the fact he criticised both sides of the El Salvadoran conflict, which started in 1980, for any actions that affected civilians. When the US-backed Salvadoran army was using death squads and torture to stop leftist revolutionaries from seizing power, he used what would become his last homily to speak out against it. "The law of God which says thou shalt not kill must come before any human order to kill. It is high time you recovered your conscience," he said, calling on the National Guard and police to stop the violence. The next day, on 24 March 1980, Archbishop Romero was shot dead as he celebrated Mass in a hospital chapel.

His death horrified the world and escalated the violence in El Salvador that spiralled into a 12-year civil war that claimed 75,000 lives

Our icon of Saint Oscar Romero, written by Sr Rosaleen Hogan, commissioned and blessed by Fr. Tony last Easter, is located at the back of our church. Why not take some time to visit it and pray?
