# **SOCIAL JUSTICE INITIATIVE - HAITI SUMMER PROJECTS**

any of you will remember that unfortunately Solèy Haiti had to defer our July 2019 Summer Volunteer programme due to the protests and uncertainty on the ground in Haiti. Over the last year or so there has been a recurring cycle of protest in Haiti sparked by ongoing anger at the current government. At the core of the frustration for the people is that in an already desperately impoverished country, there has been a significant increase in the cost of living that is driving people into more and more desperate conditions. Alongside the struggle day to day of the people, political corruption emerged as a target of that frustration.

I have been travelling to Haiti since 2006, on 19 separate occasions, and I have never known Haiti to experience a situation as dire as currently exists. In my eyes, Haiti is in the midst of a humanitarian crisis and Haitians are struggling to survive day to day.

All too often the Haitian people are forgotten by the media, and one of the most important contributions we can make in many ways is to bring awareness to the current situation in Haiti. Equally however I know you will be reading this in the midst of the Christmas season – a season of hope, positivity, kindness and generosity. If I could choose four words to describe the experience each time we are welcomed into the parishes of Mount Merrion and Kilmacud it would be those. The collections in total this year raised €10,000.41. A truly phenomenal amount. 100% of these funds will go directly to the costs of running the summer camps where 650 of the poorest kids of the area attend camp, 70 Haitians are employed, more than 26,000 meals are served; an incredible impact to the most needy and



vulnerable people in the world, an impact that would not happen without your support. Please God the July 2020 programme will be with our volunteers on the ground.

Words seem woefully inadequate relative to the level of gratitude I feel and the impact your contributions will



## make but nonetheless on behalf of Solèy Haiti, thank you.

It was difficult to return to the parishes for the first time since Fr. Tony had passed away. Fr. Tony was one of my very best friends and had an immeasurable impact on my life personally as he did with so many. I feel a deep responsibility towards the people of Haiti in terms of working on their behalf; but knowing how much Haiti and its people meant to Fr. Tony, this sense of responsibility or the meaning behind it has moved to a whole other level. Being able to return and carry on the work of Fr. Tony keeps his spirit and legacy alive in such a powerful, meaningful and impactful way and on a personal level it means the absolute

I want to finish not with my words but with those of Fr. Tony's and what I feel is one of the most powerful things he ever said. I remember him talking about life. facing his diagnosis and that it is about choice and he said, "You can choose to live, and you do life, or choose to exist and life gets done to you". What an incredible message of hope and I believe that is the lens through which we must look at Haiti, even in the current awful situation they face. We have a choice; say it is too much, too difficult and let Haitians continue to 'exist' as they currently are or take the Fr. Tony way – do whatever we can to help Haitians to 'live' the life they deserve.

On behalf of Solèy Haiti I want to wish you and your loved ones a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

## The Heritage – and the Challenge!

As a parish we are lucky to have a long tradition of financial support from our parishioners. This support has made it possible not only to build the church back in the early 1950's but to provide ongoing funding for parish running expenses. This funding has also paid for services to enhance our liturgical services — especially at those special occasions, including Christmas and Easter — and faith development initiatives.

However, as our demographics change and many of our older parishioners pass on, the continuation of this heritage falls to the young(er) generation. With falling church attendances and an ageing parish community this is becoming more challenging.

You don't need to attend the church on a regular basis to make a regular contribution!

## How is the parish financed?

### Funds transferred to the Archdiocese

You may be surprised to know that the two collections at Sunday Mass as well as the Christmas and Easter Dues are transferred directly to the Archdiocese. The first collection at Sunday Mass contributes towards the salaries of all the priests of the Diocese. The second collection contributes to the running costs of the Diocese, including the Child Safeguarding Office, as well as other services and supports to parishes in need.

### Funds retained by the parish

So, the only money collected which remains in the parish is the regular contributions (Family Offering / envelopes), donations, shrine offerings, Parish Shop profits and Parish Centre. These funds are used for parish expenses and to enhance our liturgical services and faith development.



# **PARISH GROUPS IN ACTION**

## **FAITH SPACE SUMMER & AUTUMN**

The approach of summer inevitably means exam time looms, so to support all our students we invited parishioners to write a student's name on a label and pin it to the Faith Space wall so they could be supported by our prayers. As an extra "study aid", we provided bookmarks with an Exam Prayer, an offer always well received!



Summertime itself is usually a quiet time in the Faith Space, and so we installed a Prayer for Summer, including an image of a sailing boat. We have previously used a sailing boat image as a metaphor for faith: the ship of faith, setting out on a journey, navigating through challenges, experiencing changing horizons. It also features in the Parish Tapestry which hangs near the Chapel of St. Thérèse, where it represents Fr. Tony's faith journey at the time of his Silver Jubilee in 2017.

Little did we know that within a few short weeks we would again use the ship to mark the death of Fr.Tony. There was so much we could have said, but kept it simple by including a copy of the Litany of Thanksgiving, written by Fr. Tony. This is such a positive affirmation of life and love that we felt it represented his own approach to life and reminds us to be likewise.

As Autumn approached, we thought it was time for Christian reflection on our responsibility to care for our planet and all of God's creation. Laudate Si, Pope Francis' encyclical is part of the current



zeitgeist, and links back to the series of talks given last autumn by Fr. Donal Dorr S.J. We asked the question: what did YOU do.??

We created a cobweb, representing both the strength and delicacy of creation, and added images of the positive and negative effects made by all of us.



November is always the month of remembering those who have died. As a change from the Circle of Remembrance we used in previous years, we converted the cobweb into the Web of Remembrance. Parishioners were then invited to pin a leaf onto the web and pray for the beloved deceased. By the end of November, the Web was festooned with leaves!

Advent transformed the Web again, this time to a network of stars with suggestions for actions and reflections to focus on the Coming of Christ. On Christmas Day, the Web will be sparkling with the Star of Christmas!

**Brass Plate Cleaning** 



n "The Story of a Soul" St. Thérèse of Lisieux describes how, as a very young nun she was given temporary responsibility for the Sacristy when most of the Community were laid low with flu.

"I had the privilege" she writes, "of handling the sacred vessels and preparing the altar linens to receive Our Lord."

This is what the Sacristans and the Linen section of the Altar Society do. Sacristans are like Assistant Stage Managers or Theatre Nurses in a hospital, making sure

that everything that is required for the task in hand – in this case, the proper celebration of the Eucharist and other sacraments – is in place. Their unobtrusively efficient service is an essential part of the liturgical life of the parish. The members of the Altar Linen Group ensure that the altar cloths and smaller items of linen are always pristine. Their work is worship in action.

There are other examples of unobtrusive service in and around our church. We have the two groups of "Tuesday Warriors" – the maintenance team who garden and look after the fabric of the church, and the cleaning group who ensure that the House of God is always comfortable and welcoming. Cleanliness can enhance godliness.

The word "privilege" can have negative connotations. But as St. Thérèse used it, in the context of Service of the Lord, we can see that as a parish community, we are indeed privileged. Thank God.

A big 'Thank You' to all past and present volunteers who serve in our Parish.



## Mass for the Bereaved

n the 1st & 2nd November last, parishioners were invited to light candles at any of the 6 shrines in the church in memory of family members and friends. In this way, all parishioners can unite in remembering their loved ones and friends who have died.

On Sunday 3rd November, families of parishioners from Mount Merrion who were bereaved in the last year were invited to attend a special Mass for the bereaved. This was preceded by a Candle of Light Ceremony following morning Masses to commemorate those who died. A large candle in a storm lantern was lit before morning Mass that day. After Mass the celebrant and Funeral Ministers took the candle and plants to the Garden of Remembrance in the Church grounds where short prayers were said at the commemorative stone.

Bereaved families expressed their gratitude to the Team members for enabling them to come together in their parish community to remember their loved ones.



# Sister Marie Dunne and her Music Ministry

ister Marie Dunne speaks of a special affinity with St. Thérèse of Lisieux, and it was a happy occasion when Marie joined us at the Church of St. Thérèse, a year ago, as Parish Choir Director. She responded to an invitation by Fr. Tony to take up this role. Marie, a Sister of the Holy Faith Congregation, is well known in the Diocese of Dublin as a musical director, organist, and for her faith ministry.

While her background has been in teaching (including some years as School Principal) and in Chaplaincy, it is her music ministry that is central to her life. For 30 years, Marie has been a composer of liturgical music, often for national and international events, and for a number of other Religious Congregations, especially for the St. John of God Order, where she is particularly involved in their Services – providing music for people suffering with dementia, while supporting children living with a life limiting condition, through music. Marie has also been directing the St. John of God Choir for over 30 years which comprises of staff and volunteers.

Marie has also composed music for Knock, Saint Francis' Hospice, Vocations' Ireland and many more. She has been involved with the National Missing



Persons Helpline and composed the song "A Candle for You" to remember missing persons.

Occasionally, Marie likes to celebrate her music as part of a choral concert. In 2018, one of these events was themed "A Celebration of Belonging" to mark the World Meeting of Families. In June of the same year, she organised "A Journey to the Heart", – an


event at our Church in solidarity with Fr. Tony and MND (Motor Neurone Disease Association.)

As part of her faith ministry, Marie also facilitates days/evenings of prayer and reflection.

As mentioned, Marie has been with our parish choir for almost a year. During that year, Marie organised the music for Fr. Tony's funeral, which for her was

particularly poignant as Marie had known Tony for many years, and it is because of his invitation, that she is now in this role.

Marie been inspiring both the Choir and Congregation with her music, and

Mass settings, "Mass of Providence" and "Mass of Faith", in addition to the regular church repertoire familiar to many. As she moves forward in this role in our parish, Marie's hope is that along with the choir, they will endeavour to be instruments of God's love and kindness through their music – while at the same time, welcoming the participation of the

congregation in the singing.

Many of Marie's compositions have been recorded. Her most recent collections are: "Shelter Me", "Ripples of the Divine"; and "In Memory of Me".




