### A FEW WORDS FROM FR. JOE...

What a first year it's been! Was it Dickens who spoke about the best of times and the worst of times? The past 12 months have been a roller coaster with some weeks a blur of intensely demanding ministry, with so many funerals, and then extraordinarily quiet weeks in the



depth of lock down. The first 6 weeks passed in a flash in the build up to Christmas, with lovely carols, uplifting liturgies, a packed church for Masses and so many warm words of greeting and welcome. Then we had the Peace Mass on New Year's Day and all looked good for 2020. Like the man in the Gospel who was content with his barns full of grain, we just had no idea what lay ahead. Covid-19 had crashed into our consciousness by mid-February and arrived into Ireland with a vengeance, targeting the elderly, the frail, especially those in nursing homes while we all entered in to a St Patrick's Day lockdown. Sadly, many lovely people died in the following months and we were not spared here in Mount Merrion. Gatherings of 10, made for sombre funerals, with the webcam a life line to families and friends who couldn't be present. It's been a year like no other. We are still waiting to complete the Confirmations and Communions, supporting engaged couples, and not at all sure how to begin the 2021 commitments.

So there is a huge question – what sort of parish will we be post Covid? I hope people will flock back to Mass and make up for all the time that we couldn't gather. That the sacraments will be appreciated all the more and that our faith will have matured and strengthened. I'm sure we will all be even more aware of how fragile life is, how much we need God and value our community of believers. We will have developed the digital dimension of parish and some of the blessings of technology will be embedded into how we relate to each other. Like all roller coaster rides it has been an exciting, exhilarating, stomach-churning journey. You don't control, steer or drive the roller coaster, you just hope to get off safely. I'm so proud of the parishioners who have kept the show on the road, supported the Masses, consoled the bereaved, cared for the children, looked after the priests and made it all worthwhile.

I'm looking forward to another Christmas with you and a New Year. Saying goodbye to 2020 won't be hard and my heart is full of hope that 2021 will allow us all more time shared together in prayer, in life, in friendship.

It is hard to believe we are now into the Autumn and Advent arrives late November! What a year of challenge it has been. Life is totally different. We have all been affected by the Coronavirus Pandemic. In normal times, the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) would have updated you on what we have been doing, at the Parish AGM, but our parish was in lock down from March until July. Fr Joe spoke to an empty church during the Easter ceremonies. Families have suffered bereavement.


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### SHINING A LIGHT ON CREATION

n September 1st, here at the Church of St Thérèse, we celebrated Pope Francis' "World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation", by lighting the Eco-Congregation's Climate Justice Candle. This was the first day of the Season of Creation, which the global Christian family annually celebrates in prayer and action.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions advising against large events or small group gatherings, we celebrated the Season prayerfully instead. The Candle, placed near the altar within a display of seasonal foliage, served as a focus for quiet reflection on the beauty and care of Our Common Home. Central to this was Laudato Si's call "to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with ALL God's Creation".



Throughout the month, our parish newsletter and website conveyed a series of "Season of Creation" images and references, with additional insights reflected in our Prayers of the Faithful, Music Ministry, and Library. In the Faith Space a display was mounted which creatively merged visuals with text from Laudato Si's, "A Prayer for the Earth", and verses on nature in the thoughtful "Meadow" poem.

Our activities were inspired by Laudato Si's special anniversary year (May '20 - May '21), and a talk by former Trocaire CEO, Justin Kilcullen. Speaking to the parish in 2019, Justin



spoke about how parishes are responding to the climate and biodiversity crises. Encouraged, we coordinated a small task-specific group (with Church Administration, Gardening Group, Parish Pastoral Council. and Youth representatives) and began to complete an environmental check-up. This was a simple audit, with four key areas -Spiritual, Practical, Community and Global. A checklist of "have done" (e.g. paper recycling) and "could consider" (eg Creation Walks, workshops, 'green" pastoral resources) tick boxes helped to identify current good practice and future priorities. ECI (Eco-Congregation Ireland) awarded our efforts with its' "AWARENESS" certificate, a first step towards becoming an Eco-Parish.



Although in early stages, our emerging ideas online, include ecothemed film and book clubs, youth talks and events, web development, "green" homilies, and reflections (e.g. water at Baptism). Additionally, we are hopeful that our current contact with DLR's Sustainable Transport and Biodiversity projects will result in bicycle stands, safe walkways, and developing our meadow.

All are welcome to participate in our quest to become a parish aiming to find ways to care for Our Common Home.

### SOCIAL JUSTICE INITIATIVE – HAITI SUMMER PROJECTS

Dear Parishoners,

I hope you are all doing well during these extraordinary times we have been living in this last number of months. There is nobody amongst us who hasn't been affected by Covid-19 to some degree and that unfortunate fact is the same wherever you go in the world; the same is certainly the case for Haiti.

Daily life for Haitians remains incredibly difficult and has worsened over the last year or so. The cost of living in Haiti continues to increase at an unsustainable rate. A somewhat large bag of rice in Haiti as recently as August has cost approximately \$22 US and more than half of Haitians earn less than \$1 a day! Covid-19 has been another unfortunate added pressure. It is extremely difficult for Social Distancing to be practiced given the density of population. One of the major economic activities on a local level is the trading market. However Haitians, the majority of whom have not got access to electricity and certainly not internet access, do not have the option of working from home. To try and get enough rice or water to feed their family is the challenge; they simply must go to their market stall and work. There is so much more to the challenge of daily life and indeed Covid-19's impact in Haiti.

We had Fr.Tony's first anniversary recently and what wonderful tributes in both parishes to Tony. He would have been incredibly proud of both parishes and the community spirit which continues to thrive.

For us as a charity, Solèy Haiti could not travel to Gros Morne, Haiti this summer on account of Covid-19. The Summer Camps for the local children could not proceed safely either given how challenging it would be to implement social distancing protocols safely. However please be assured that your incredibly generous support of Solèy Haiti and its work in Haiti will truly make a life-changing difference to our project beneficiary. Our local partners identified a local family desperately in need of a home to be constructed for them. The name of the father of the family is Marcel Charleron. He is a tailor by trade and has three children which he takes



care of by himself. He manages to just about support them with his work but had not been able to construct a safe house for them to live in. He had a mud and tin roof house, but it suffered severe damage during the earthquake. So while we must acknowledge the reality of life in Haiti, in Solèy Haiti our aim is always to mirror the spirit of the Haitian people in the face of such a challenge, and to meet it with resilience and hope.

We had Fr. Tony's first anniversary recently and what wonderful tributes in both parishes to Tony. He would have been incredibly proud of both parishes and the community spirit which continues to thrive. I had been thinking about him a lot in the preceding weeks and what we could do in Haiti to permanently honour his memory. In true Tony fashion, I felt like I needed to stop thinking and just do it!! I want to let you know some initial details of a memorial project I am planning for Fr. Tony in Haiti. There is a local primary school, 'L'Ekol Jezi Mari (The School of Jesus and Mary), which Tony had been involved with. They require four additional classrooms in order for their children to be able to complete their primary education. So the memorial project for Tony will be to build the 'Fr. Tony wing' to this school in Haiti so these children can have what Tony always passionately felt was their absolute right and entitlement – an opportunity and chance at a better future.

I normally speak at weekend masses in November. Given the current Covid-19 context, who knows what form it will take. But what I will be doing is setting up a dedicated fundraising page online for this project and I will have more details of the fundraising page and the project itself when I am speaking with you in November.

Take care and I look forward to seeing you soon.

### PARISH GROUPS IN ACTION FAITH SPACE SUMMER & AUTUMN

n the early days of January 2020, the Faith Space Group had our usual good humoured and animated meeting to sketch out our ideas for the coming year. Who could have guessed that in a matter of mere weeks we would have to completely re-evaluate our plans.



We began the Spring season by celebrating St Brigid, using one of many stained-glass images of the saint, and suggesting that her qualities of goodness and resourcefulness can still inspire us now.

Pope Francis always has his finger on the pulse of the twenty first century. He encourages us to become more familiar with the "textbooks" of our Faith, and so we suggested that scripture reading might be considered an everyday occurrence, like grocery shopping, and we borrowed books from the parish library (available to all!) placing them in a supermarket basket (also borrowed for the occasion!) Then it was time to offer some thoughts on how to approach Lent and Easter. In the same way that Operation Transformation challenges people to reevaluate their physical and mental health, we proposed a "Lent Formation", with tasks to do the same for our spiritual development. Those tasks, however, came to an abrupt halt on March 27 as the church doors closed and the country entered Lockdown.



When the doors finally reopened at the end of June, we were all rather uncertain about how to resume our lives in the community. To try to express this, we installed a sunshine graphic of reasons to be grateful, with the message that "Every day may not be good, but there is some good in every day".

Summer progressed quietly and came to an end with a low key installation to mark the first anniversary of Fr Tony's death on August 28 2019, using a collage designed to mark his Silver Jubilee in 2016 and the uplifting Litany of Thanksgiving written by him. Fr Tony .... ioved and respected by ali

In September, the Season of Creation, we turned again to Pope Francis, and considered his exhortation to us all to remember our duty to care for all creation by taking action against the thoughtless destruction of our Earth. Using a prayer suggestion from the Dublin Diocesan Website, we illustrated it with a large leaf shape composed of small leaves: small actions together form the Big Picture. This connected with the arrival in our church of the Candle of Eco-Congregation Ireland to which our parish is now affiliated.

Part of our duty of care requires we show compassion and enable justice for refugees. We chose lines from a poem "Home" by Warsan Shire, together with images of contemporary sculptures in Rome and Dublin which portray the fear and desperation of those trying to escape violence and injustice.

We now approach November, the month of Remembrance. Last year we invited parishioners to pin a leaf on a cobweb in memory of a beloved departed, but this year as we must continue to stay apart, the interactive aspect of our remembering must sadly be curtailed.

### **CHILDREN'S CHOIR**

ike everyone else, the Mount Merrion Parish Children's Choir have had to make major changes to how we sing together.

During the lockdown period, we created a YouTube channel, and posted compilation videos of the children singing some of their favorite songs and hymns. They had a different project each week and looked forward to seeing the finished product and being YouTube stars! Once public Mass resumed, we were able to get back to singing together, with just ten or twelve children at Mass each week, to comply with guidelines. Unfortunately, we have had to suspend practices or large group singing until there is a substantial improvement in the situation nationally. It is a challenging



time for any 'arts'- based group, and it very difficult for the children to lose the social element of the choir. I was very happy to see that each week when we were able to sing in the Church, there was still huge interest in getting a spot!



### This feels like a new world – *reflections during covid*.



have been privileged to work in healthcare, as a doctor in St James' Hospital, during Covid-19. This has led to many new

challenges on a daily basis, which have been covered to the point of exhaustion by the media, and I'm sure we are all sick of hearing about that, so I won't dwell too much on it now.

What I do want to reflect on is how this pandemic has brought the best out in people. I have seen so many small and large kindnesses in the past few weeks, both in and out of work, that were unexpected.

I bumped into one of my colleagues emerging from the hospital shop, armed with a few newspapers, an Ireland's Own, and a car magazine. I asked her what she was doing with such atypical reading material – it transpired that one of her patients was in isolation after being a close contact of a patient with Covid, and was not allowed to leave his room. He did not have his wallet with him either, and so was unable to order anything for himself from the shop. So, Jayne had decided to rectify the problem for him herself, bringing a little bit of brightness into his day.

Another patient, who sadly subsequently passed away from Covid, was very distressed as she had no rosary beads; within twenty four hours, about ten pairs had arrived outside Peggy's room, from various staff members who did not want her to be without that simple solace.

Unfortunately, visiting of all patients, both covid and non-covid, has been severely restricted in order to prevent spread; this has meant that families have faced separation for the first time, in some cases, in decades. Many people donated old iPads and tablets to the hospital, so that patients could Facetime with their families, bringing some comfort in being able to actually lay eyes on one another, even if it is at a distance.

Everyone is much friendlier in work these days. It's a rarity now to pass someone on the corridor or stairs without them nodding and smiling, or often stopping – at a distance – to check how each other is doing. I think we have all become more aware of one another, and of the fact that outside of the working environment, people are facing all kinds of challenges – from childcare to illness to bereavement – which they have never faced before.

In our communities too, acts of kindness are happening every day. Neighbours are helping each other with things like shopping, gardening, and even just socially distanced chats! We are helping each other merely by staying apart, an act of thoughtfulness in and of itself.

I managed to escape work early one Friday, and on spec, asked my mum if she'd like to come up to the Church with me to say a prayer and light a candle. I realised as we entered that the weeks when we were in lockdown were the longest time we had ever been away from this church and its community. I will never take it for granted again.

Covid-19 is a reminder to us that we cannot take each other or the places and hobbies we love for granted; that we are never in total control of our lives; and that for some things, there is no quick fix, no immediate answer. We must trust in God now more than ever and remember this sense of community and togetherness when we have finally come out the other end. He is with us always, and can be felt now more than ever, especially in our healthcare settings.

As a member of the Parish Pastoral Council, this was something upon which we reflected at our last meeting. We all look forward enormously to the day when we can be physically together again and continue to build on that spirit of fellowship that we already do so well in Mount Merrion.

## FR. TONY: A PILGRIM MAN

ony was a pilgrim man. The hallmarks of a pilgrim are personal development, reflection and learning. These particular values are what I admired most in Tony. Tony's pilgrimages took students from Ballymun to Croke Patrick, UCD Volunteers Overseas to India, Haiti and parish pilgrimages to the Holy Land and his beloved Glendalough.

Pilgrimages are spiritual and emotional journeys where people forge solidarities, tell stories, and come closer to each other and God. This forging of people is the way Tony created communities of people around him. He had an extraordinary ability to gather many people from all kinds of backgrounds on his life's pilgrimage. The story of Tony's life is of a man who journeyed deep within himself and burned with love of God, as expressed in the life and public ministry of Jesus of Nazareth. Tony was passionate about sharing the love, compassion and inclusivity of our God.

This love of God took Tony on a very visible Pilgrim journey 'Walk While You Can' from Donegal to Cork just as he



was diagnosed with Motor Neuron Disease. Along Tony's pilgrimage he shared with the nation his humour, humility and his humanity... He passionately believed in living each day... as he said, 'life is fragile, grab it with two hands, hold onto it and treasure it'. 
